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ollowing the announcement of budget 2022, analysts have appreciated the digital initiatives of the government, from the creation of a 'digital university' to a 'central digital currency' by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI).

Besides the allocation of Rs 1,04,278 crore for the education sector, an increase of 11.86 per cent compared to the revised 2021-22 gross allocation of Rs 93.223 crore, finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman has proposed to set up a new digital university that will function on the basis of a networked hub and spoke model. This refers to a distribution method in which the main foundation originates from a centralised 'hub' and it then moves to smaller locales (spokes,) for final consumption. The Central government

The Central government plans to use India's best public universities and institutions as hubs while the students who consume the classes right from their home will be the spokes. According to the budget, each hub will be expected to build "cutting edge information and communication technology expertise."

As per the finance minists's speech, the classes generated by the 'hubs' will be made available in different languages for wider appeal among students. The digital university will be set up as per ISTE standards (a benchmark employed for the use of technology in teaching and learning), the finance minister said.

ADAPTING IN THE PANDEMIC ERA

Tapping the rising opportunity in the e-learning space during the pandemic, the government appears keen to leverage this sector. "Due

to the pandemic-induced closure of schools, our children, particularly in the rural areas, and those from scheduled castes and tribes, and other weaker sections, have lost almost two years of formal education. Most of these are children in government schools," the finance minister had said.

This will surely give wings to the dreams of deserving students and meet the goal of providing high-quality education to all students across the country."

TV FOR LEARNING

Apart from the proposal to create a digital university, Nirmala Sitharaman also pitched the "need to impart supplementary teaching and to build a resilient mechanism for education delivery." She said, "For this purpose, 'one dass-one TV channel' programme of PM eVIDYA will be expanded from 12 to 200 TV channels. This will enable all states to provide supplementary education in regional languages for classes 1-12."

To this, FLAME Univer-

sity's Kamdar notes that "the plan to increase the one class-one TV channel' programme will enable students to learn through radio and DTH channels thereby overcoming the problem of internet connectivity." Kamdar adds, "The two decisions truly reflect the government's aims to leverage technology advancements and use them as tools to meet the educational aspirations of a large number of students in the country. They have set an example that is worthy of being emulated by others."

Prajodh Kajan, co-founder and group CEO, Lighthouse Learning, says, "The much-awaited union budget has delivered many positive developments for the education sector. The implementation of one class-one IV channel programme should help mitigate the learning loss our children have endured during the past two years as schools remain closed. The government's proposal to develop a Digital DESH e-portal is a significant initiative, making them more marketable and reducing the skill gap. which will benefit both job seekers and employers. This budget is in line with our aim of democratising education by providing students with high-quality learning opportunities, enhancing learning outcomes, and contributing to a thriving knowledge economy."
